Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Notes linked to Tempur-pedic International

Description

Report Prepared On: 08/02/13

Goldman Sachs issued \$4.64 million of Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Notes linked to Tempur-pedic International on October 27, 2011 at \$1,000 per note.

These notes are Goldman Sachs-branded Buffered PLUS securities that do not pay periodic coupons, but instead pay a single amount at maturity depending on the final level of Tempur-pedic International's stock.


If on April 22, 2013 Tempur-pedic International's stock price is higher than \$746.67, but lower than \$864.29, the notes pay a return equal to the percentage increase in Tempur-pedic International's stock multiplied by 1.5, up to a cap of 23.63%. If on April 22, 2013 the refe is below \$746.67 but not below \$672.00, investors receive \$1,000 face value per note. If Tempur-pedic International's stock price on April 22, 2013 is lower than \$672.00, investors receive face value per note reduced by 1.11 times the amount the reference asset is below \$672.00 as a percent of the initial level, \$746.67.

Valuation

This product can be valued as a combination of a note from Goldman Sachs, 1.11 short out-of-the-money put options, 1.5 long at-the-money call options, and 1.5 short out-of-the-money call options. For reasonable valuation inputs this note was worth \$784.55 when it was issued on October 27, 2011 because the value of the options investors gave Goldman Sachs plus the interest investors would have received on Goldman Sachs's straight debt was worth \$215.45 more than the options investors received from Goldman Sachs.

There is no active secondary market for most structured products. Structured products, including this note, therefore are much less liquid than simple stocks, bonds, notes and mutual funds. Investors are likely to receive less than the structured product's estimated market value if they try to sell the structured product prior to maturity. Our valuations do not incorporate this relative lack of liquidity and therefore should be considered an upper bound on the value of the structured product.

Payoff Curve at Maturity




The payoff diagram shows the final payoff of this note given Tempur-pedic International's stock price (borizontal axis). For comparison, the dashed line shows the payoff if you invested in Tempur-pedic International's stock directly.

Maturity Payoff Diagram




The contingent payoffs of this Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note.

Analysis


This Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note pays investors the increase in Tempur-pedic International's stock multiplied by 1.5 capped at 23.63%, but if Tempur-pedic International's stock declines over the term of the note, investors will suffer losses equal to the percentage decline in Tempur-pedic International's stock. In addition, investors bear the credit risk of Goldman Sachs. Investors purchasing this Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note effectively sell at-the-money put and out-of-the-money call options to Goldman Sachs, buy at-the-money call options, and a zero-coupon note from Goldman Sachs. This Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note is fairly priced if and only if the market value of the options investors received from Goldman Sachs equals the market value of the options investors gave Goldman Sachs plus the interest investors would have received on Goldman Sachs's straight debt.

Goldman Sachs's Stock Price




The graph above shows the adjusted closing price of the issuer Goldman Sachs for the past several years. The stock price of the issuer is an indication of the financial strength of Goldman Sachs. The adjusted price shown above incorporates any stock split, reverse stock split, etc.

Goldman Sachs's CDS Rate



Credit default swap (CDS) rates are the market price that investors require to bear credit risk of an issuer such as Goldman Sachs. CDS rates are usually given in basis points (bps). One basis point equals 0.01%. Higher CDS rates reflect higher perceived credit risk, higher required yields, and therefore lower market value of Goldman Sachs's debt, including outstanding Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note. Fluctuations in Goldman Sachs's CDS rate impact the market value of the notes in the secondary market.

Tempur-pedic International's Stock Price




The graph above shows the historical levels of Tempur-pedic International's stock for the past several years. The final payoff of this note is determined by Tempur-pedic International's stock price at maturity. Higher fluctuations in Tempur-pedic International's stock price correspond to a greater uncertainty in the final payout of this Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note.

Realized Payoff


This note matured on April 29, 2013 and investors received \$69.88 per note.

Reference Asset Tempur-pedic International's Stock's Implied Volatility



The annualized implied volatility of Tempur-pedic International's stock on October 20, 2011 was 57.42%, meaning that options contracts on Tempur-pedic International's stock were trading at prices that reflect an expected annual volatility of 57.42%. The higher the implied volatility, the larger the expected fluctuations of Tempur-pedic International's stock price and of the Note's market value during the life of the Notes.

Decomposition of this Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note



This note can be decomposed into different components, and each component can be valued separately. The chart above shows the value of each component of this Leveraged Buffered Index-Linked Note.

- 1. Delta measures the sensitivity of the price of the note to the Tempur-pedic International's stock price on October 20, 2011.

 2. CDS rates can be considered a measure of the probability that an issuer will default over a certain period of time and the likely loss given a default. The lower the CDS rate, the lower the default probability. CDS rate is given in basis points (1 basis point equals 0.01%), and is considered as a market premium, on top of the risk-free rate, that investors require to insure against a potential default.

 3. Fair price evaluation is based on the Black-Scholes model of the Tempur-pedic International's stock on October 20, 2011.

 4. Calculated payout at maturity is only an approximation, and may differ from actual payouts at maturity.

 5. Our evaluation does not include any transaction fees, broker commissions, or liquidity discounts on the notes.
