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Yield Optimization Notes With Contingent Protection linked to Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.

Description

HSBC issued \$2.91 million of Yield Optimization Notes With Contingent Protection linked to Goldman Sachs Group, Inc. on June 30, 2010 at \$136.66 per note.

These notes are HSBC-branded single observation reverse convertibles. Single observation reverse convertibles pay periodic interest coupons and at maturity convert into shares of the reference security if the price of the reference security at the notes' maturity is below the trigger price determined when the notes were issued.


These 24-month notes pay monthly coupons at an annualized rate of 9.60%. In addition to the monthly coupons, on June 29, 2012 investors will receive the market value of one share of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock if on June 25, 2012 Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock closes below \$109.33 (80% of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price on June 28, 2010). Otherwise, investors will receive the \$136.66 face value per note.

Valuation

This HSBC single observation reverse convertible linked to Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock can be valued as a combination of a note from HSBC and a short European out-of-the-money cash-or-nothing binary put option, and a short European out-of-the-money put option on Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock. For reasonable valuation inputs this note was worth \$128.26 per \$136.66 when it was issued on June 30, 2010 because investors were effectively being paid only \$18.18 for giving HSBC options which were worth \$26.58.

There is no active secondary market for most structured products. Structured products, including this note, therefore are much less liquid than simple stocks, bonds, notes and mutual funds. Investors are likely to receive less than the structured product's estimated market value if they try to sell the structured product prior to maturity. Our valuations do not incorporate this relative lack of liquidity and therefore should be considered an upper bound on the value of the structured product.

Payoff Curve at Maturity




The payoff diagram shows the final payoff of this note given Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price (horizontal axis). For comparison, the dashed line shows the payoff if you invested in Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock directly.

Maturity Payoff Diagram




The contingent payoffs of this Yield Optimization Note With Contingent Protection.

Analysis

This single observation reverse convertible's 9.60% coupon rate is higher than the yield HSBC paid on its straight debt but, in addition to HSBC's credit risk, investors bear the risk that they will receive shares of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock when those shares are worth substantially less than the face value of the note at maturity.


Investors purchasing these reverse convertibles effectively sell put options to HSBC and post the note's issue price as collateral to secure satisfaction of the investors' obligations under the option contracts. HSBC pays investors a "coupon" that is part payment for the put options and part interest on the investors' posted collateral. This reverse convertible is fairly priced if and only if the difference between the reverse convertible's "coupon rate" and interest paid on HSBC's straight debt equals the value of the put option investors are giving to HSBC. Whether this reverse convertible is suitable or not is identically equivalent to whether selling put options on the reference stock at the option premium being paid by HSBC was suitable for the investor.

HSBC's Stock Price




The graph above shows the adjusted closing price of the issuer HSBC for the past several years. The stock price of the issuer is an indication of the financial strength of HSBC. The adjusted price shown above incorporates any stock split, reverse stock split, etc.

HSBC's CDS Rate



Credit default swap (CDS) rates are the market price that investors require to bear credit risk of an issuer such as HSBC. CDS rates are usually given in basis points (bps). One basis point equals 0.01%. Higher CDS rates reflect higher perceived credit risk, higher required yields, and therefore lower market value of HSBC's debt, including outstanding Yield Optimization Note With Contingent Protection. Fluctuations in HSBC's CDS rate impact the market value of the notes in the secondary market.


Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s Stock Price



The graph above shows the historical levels of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock for the past several years. The final payoff of this note is determined by Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price at maturity. Higher fluctuations in Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price correspond to a greater uncertainty in the final payout of this Yield Optimization Note With Contingent Protection.


Realized Payoff

This note matured on June 29, 2012 and investors received \$91.22 per note (or equal to the value of one share of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc. stock's closing price on June 25, 2012).



The annualized implied volatility of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock on June 28, 2010 was 39.43%, meaning that options contracts on Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock were trading at prices that reflect an expected annual volatility of 39.43%. The higher the implied volatility, the larger the expected fluctuations of Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price and of the Note's market value during the life of the Notes.

Decomposition of this Yield Optimization Note With Contingent Protection



This note can be decomposed into different components, and each component can be valued separately. The chart above shows the value of each component of this Yield Optimization Note With Contingent Protection.

- Delta measures the sensitivity of the price of the note to the Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock price on June 28, 2010.
 CDS rates can be considered a measure of the probability that an issuer will default over a certain period of time and the likely loss given a default. The lower the CDS rate, the lower the default probability. CDS rate is given in basis points (1 basis point equals 0.01%), and is considered as a market premium, on top of the risk-free rate, that investors require to insure against a potential default.
 Fair price evaluation is based on the Black-Scholes model of the Goldman Sachs Group, Inc.'s stock on June 28, 2010.
 Calculated payout at maturity is only an approximation, and may differ from actual payouts at maturity.
 Our evaluation does not include any transaction fees, broker commissions, or liquidity discounts on the notes.
