# Reverse Exchangeable Notes linked to InterOil Corp.

# Description

Lehman Brothers issued \$1.59 million of Reverse Exchangeable Notes linked to InterOil Corp. on July 31, 2007 at \$1,000 per note.

These notes are Lehman Brothers-branded reverse convertibles. Reverse convertibles pay periodic interest coupons and at maturity convert into shares of the reference security if the price of the reference stock at the notes' maturity is below its price when the notes were issued and had closed below a specified "trigger" during the term of the notes.


These 3-month notes pay monthly coupons at an annualized rate of 44.20%. In addition to the monthly coupons, at maturity on October 31, 2007 investors will receive the market value of 50.38 shares of InterOil Corp.'s stock if on October 26, 2007 InterOil Corp.'s stock price closes below \$19.85 (InterOil Corp.'s stock price on July 26, 2007) and had ever closed at or below \$13.90 during the term of the notes. Otherwise, investors will receive the \$1,000 face value per note.

# Valuation

This Lehman Brothers reverse convertible linked to InterOil Corp.'s stock can be valued as a combination of a note from Lehman Brothers and a short down-and-in, at-the-money put option on InterOil Corp.'s stock. For reasonable valuation inputs this note was worth \$865.94 per \$1,000 when it was issued on July 31, 2007 because investors were effectively being paid only \$95.77 for giving Lehman Brothers an option which was worth \$229.83.

There is no active secondary market for most structured products. Structured products, including this note, therefore are much less liquid than simple stocks, bonds, notes and mutual funds. Investors are likely to receive less than the structured product's estimated market value if they try to sell the structured product prior to maturity. Our valuations do not incorporate this relative lack of liquidity and therefore should be considered an upper bound on the value of the structured product.

## Payoff Curve at Maturity



The payoff diagram shows the final payoff of this note given InterOil Corp.'s stock price (horizontal axis). For comparison, the dashed line shows the payoff if you invested in InterOil Corp.'s stock directly.



## Maturity Payoff Diagram




The contingent payoffs of this Reverse Exchangeable Note.

## Analysis

This reverse convertible's 44.20% coupon rate is higher than the yield Lehman Brothers paid on its straight debt but, in addition to Lehman Brothers's credit risk, investors bear the risk that they will receive shares of InterOil Corp.'s stock when they are worth substantially less than the face value of the note at maturity.


Investors purchasing reverse convertibles effectively sell put options to Lehman Brothers and post the note's issue price as collateral to secure satisfaction of the investors' obligations under the option contracts. Lehman Brothers pays investors a "coupon" that is part payment for the put options and part interest on the investors' posted collateral. This reverse convertible is fairly priced if and only if the excess of the reverse convertible's "coupon rate" above the interest Lehman Brothers pays on its straight debt equals the value of the put option investors are giving to Lehman Brothers. Whether the reverse convertible is suitable or not is equivalent to whether selling put options on the reference stock at the option premium being paid by Lehman Brothers was suitable for the investor.

#### Lehman Brothers's Stock Price




The graph above shows the adjusted closing price of the issuer Lehman Brothers for the past several years. The stock price of the issuer is an indication of the financial strength of Lehman Brothers. The adjusted price shown above incorporates any stock split, reverse stock split, etc.

## Lehman Brothers's CDS Rate



Credit default swap (CDS) rates are the market price that investors require to bear credit risk of an issuer such as Lehman Brothers. CDS rates are usually given in basis points (bps). One basis point equals 0.01%. Higher CDS rates reflect higher perceived credit risk, higher required yields, and therefore lower market value of Lehman Brothers's debt, including outstanding Reverse Exchangeable Note. Fluctuations in Lehman Brothers's CDS rate impact the market value of the notes in the secondary market.




## InterOil Corp.'s Stock Price

The graph above shows the historical levels of InterOil Corp.'s stock for the past several years. The final payoff of this note is determined by InterOil Corp.'s stock price at maturity. Higher fluctuations in InterOil Corp.'s stock price correspond to a greater uncertainty in the final payout of this Reverse Exchangeable Note.

## **Realized Payoff**


This note matured on October 31, 2007 and investors received \$1,000.00 per note.

## Reference Asset InterOil Corp.'s Stock's Implied Volatility



The annualized implied volatility of InterOil Corp.'s stock on July 26, 2007 was 124.57%, meaning that options contracts on InterOil Corp.'s stock were trading at prices that reflect an expected annual volatility of 124.57%. The higher the implied volatility, the larger the expected fluctuations of InterOil Corp.'s stock price and of the Note's market value during the life of the Notes.

### Decomposition of this Reverse Exchangeable Note



This note can be decomposed into different components, and each component can be valued separately. The chart above shows the value of each component of this Reverse Exchangeable Note.

- Delta measures the sensitivity of the price of the note to the InterOil Corp's stock price on July 26, 2007.
  CDS rates can be considered a measure of the probability that an issuer will default over a certain period of time and the likely loss given a default. The lower the CDS rate, the lower the default probability. CDS rate is given in basis points (1 basis point equals 0.01%), and is considered as a market premium, on top of the risk-free rate, that investors require to insure against a potential default.
  3. Fair price evaluation is based on the Black-Scholes model of the InterOil Corp's stock on July 26, 2007.
  4. Calculated payout at maturity is only an approximation, and may differ from actual payouts at maturity.
  5. Our evaluation does not include any transaction fees, broker commissions, or liquidity discounts on the notes.

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
